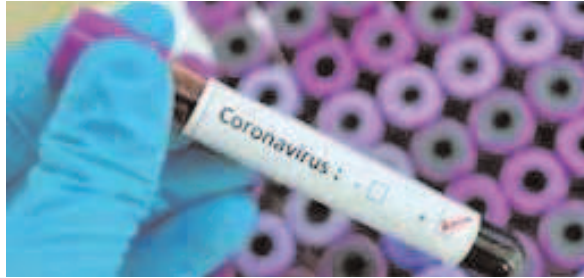


299 new COVID-19 cases register in Surat

Surat. 299 fresh cases of COVID-19 were recorded in Surat on Sunday, taking the total number of cases to 12268. Twelve persons died due to COVID19 on Sunday taking the total number of deaths to 544 in Surat. 187 patients suffering from COVID19 were discharged from hospitals on Sunday. 8080 patients have been discharged from hospital till date. 65 years old male from Rander road in Rander zone died due to COVID19 at New Civil Hospital (NCH) on Sunday. 74 years old female from Budiya village in Udhna zone died during treatment at NCH on Sunday. 59 years old

Surat Municipal Commissioner Banchanidhi Pani said that 201 cases have been registered in Surat city on Sunday including 17 cases in Katargam zone, 14 cases in Central zone, 9 cases in Limbayat zone, 8 cases in Varachha B zone, 30 cases in Varachha A zone, 55 cases in Rander zone, 21 cases in Udhna zone and 47 cases in

Athwa zone. Pani added that 20156 persons are in Home Quarantine, while 70 persons are in government facility quarantine. 2316 teams of Surat Municipal Corporation conducted a survey in 3301864 homes and 850489 people.

Among those tested positive for COVID19 on Sunday include doctors, technicians, food cart owners, hawkers, hand cart owners and small retailers. Government has given permission to start business, but small retailers are facing a dual blow, as they have to deal with COVID19 scare and bread.

Demand for plasma therapy on the rise as hospitals await clinical trial's result

Surat. From the initial days of the Covid-19 outbreak to the present, the demand for plasma therapy has only gone up with the Union Health Ministry having permitted plasma therapy for off-label use in moderate Covid-19 patients. Considering the constraints that come with plasma donation, the Ahmedabad Municipal Corporation (AMC) is trying to incentivise the process wherein a donor will be awarded an appreciation certificate and four of their family members could avail a free, entire body check-up at the civic-run SVP Hospital once this year.

Since the first plasma donation in the state in Ahmedabad on April 18 from a 24-year-old woman who had returned from Paris and contracted the viral infection, there have been 105 donations in Ahmedabad as of July 23, of which 60 have taken place in July. On the contrary, Surat saw its first plasma donor on July 6 and has seen 117 people donate plasma since. While plasma therapy was exclu-

sively administered as part of a clinical trial in April, the Union Health Ministry in the third week of June, as part of its clinical management guidelines, permitted plasma therapy for off-label use in moderate patients as an investigational therapy. The result of the clinical trial is awaited.

There are two plasma banks in Ahmedabad, one at BJ Medical College and the other at Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS). AMC-run SVP Hospital has a tie-up with IRCS, wherein SVP Hospital pays Rs 10,000 per patient for the administrative costs incurred by IRCS. A single donation equals to 400 ml of plasma, that is two units of 200 ml each. Deputy Municipal Commissioner in AMC, Om Prakash Machra said, "There is no shortage; we could not capitalise on this therapy as it was still a part of the clinical trial. Moreover, the awareness is presently low. There is also a specific convalescent period, a short window when plasma can be donated."

Self-financed schools to resume online classes from tomorrow in Gujarat



AHMEDABAD: After a three-day hiatus, the self-financed schools in Gujarat will resume online education for students from Monday. The development comes even as the stand-off between the schools and Gujarat government continues on the matter of fee collection during the Covid-19 lockdown period. The Federation of Self-Financed Schools, Gujarat, which claims to have more than 15,000 schools as members, today decided to reverse its earlier decision of putting online learning in abeyance till the government withdraws its July 16 notification. The schools associated with the federation, cover about 27 lakh students and 7.5 lakh teachers.

tion dated July 16 and made available on Wednesday, the state education department had directed self-financed schools to not collect fees for the lockdown period till the schools re-open physically. The government has also directed schools not to hike fees for the academic year 2020-21. Schools which have already collected fees from parents will have to adjust them when the schools re-open physically.

The decision has not gone down well with many schools and associations with the Federation of Self-Financed Schools, Gujarat challenging the government directive in Gujarat high court. Opposing the Gujarat government's order the Association of Progressive Schools (AOPS) has decided to launch a #SaveOurSchools campaign on digital platforms. The campaign is aimed to create a voice of concern towards school education, they said a media statement. "We have received tremendous support from parents and other sections of the society," said Manan Choksi, past president of AOPS. A large number of parents have shown their disagreement towards the government's decision, Choksi said. "Buoyed by their support, we are launching a digital campaign #SaveOurSchools," he added.

The decision was taken at an online meeting of trustees of various self-financed schools on Saturday evening, said Deepak Rajguru, spokesperson of the Federation. "We took the decision to ensure that there is no further learning loss for students amid Covid-19 crisis," he said. Many schools started sending mobile messages to parents and students about online classes resuming from Monday. Mobile phones of parents were abuzz with messages from self-financed schools on Saturday about online classes resuming from Monday. This has ended the uncertainty for many students. In a notification dated July 16 and made available on Wednesday, the state education department had directed self-financed schools to not collect fees for the lockdown period till the schools re-open physically. Principal Secretary, Health, Jayanti Ravi said, "It would be the 18th week of Ahmedabad Civil Hospital serving (Covid-19 patients) and it is always good to acknowledge and appreciate the excellent work by all."

The hospital came under much scrutiny during the pandemic, including patients complaining of delayed admission and reports of high fatalities. In May, the Gujarat High court equated the hospital to "dungeons or worse".

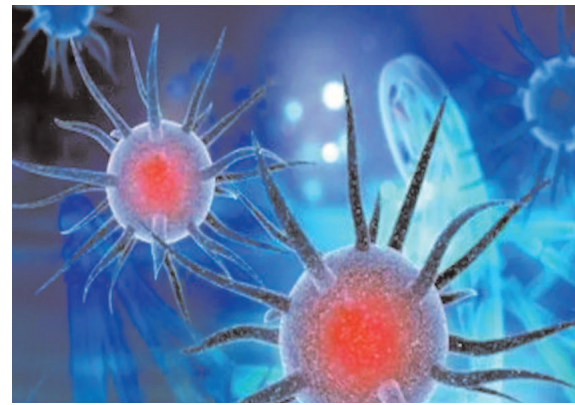
18 fresh cases of COVID-19 recorded in D&NH

Ashwin Patel, Silvassa. 18 persons were tested positive for COVID-19 in Dadra & Nagar Haveli (D&NH) on Sunday. According to administration, 232 patients have been discharged from the hospitals till date. Three COVID19 patients have been migrated to other states, while one patient has died due to coronavirus.

Six patients tested positive are ILI (Influenza Like Illness) patients, while five patients have been identified during random screening. Three patients

are contacts of COVID-19 patients and four patients have travel history.

There are 171 Containment Zones in D&NH. This includes Bhandari ni Chawl at Dhamni Road in Dadra, Jayesh ni Chawl in Tighra, Padmavati Vihar in Silvassa, Balaji Township at Amla in Silvassa, Vikas Complex at Tokarkhada in Silvassa, Greenwood Apartment at Kilvani Naka, Triupati Nagar at Tokarkhada, Mahendra ni Chawl at Mori Falia in Naroli, Opposite



Ramayan Complex at Samarvarni, Prakash ni Chawl at Bhurkund Falia, Mohan ni Chawl at Bhasta Falia, Shashav ni Chawl at School Falia in Baldevi, Mukesh ni

Ahmedabad records one inch avg rain: Heavy rain likely in south Gujarat

AHMEDABAD: With several areas in Ahmedabad recording over three inches of rainfall on Saturday, the city recorded over an inch of average rainfall the same evening. Areas that witnessed heavy rainfall in the city included Gota at 3.2 inches rainfall, Bodakdev (2.9 inches), Dhudheshwar (2.16 inches), Chandkehdha (1.79 inches), Usmanpura (1.7 inches), Ranip (1.16 inches), Sarkhej (1.1 inch) and Danapith (1 inch) between 5 pm and 7 pm. Akhbarnagar underpass was closed for traffic following heavy rainfall, while five complaints of felling of trees were reported by the Ahmedabad Municipal Corporation (AMC) control room. The northwest zone recorded the highest of 3.41 inches rainfall, followed by central zone (1.68 inches), west zone (1.39 inch) and southwest zone (1.2 inch rainfall). Heavy rainfall occurred across the state on Saturday in the districts of Gandhinagar, Mehsana, Kheda, Tapi, Amreli, Surendranagar, Surat, Bharuch, Dang, Porbandar, Sabarkantha, Devbhumi Dwarka and Jamnagar. The India Meteorological Department (IMD) also issued a warning of thunderstorm with lightning and surface wind less than 40 kmph, accompanied with heavy rain in parts of the state, till July 27.

Bus services suspended for 10 days in Surat from Monday

Surat. The Gujarat government on Saturday decided to suspend Gujarat State Road Transport Corporation (GSRTC)-run and private bus services to and from the district for 10 days, beginning Monday, after the area witnessed a steady rise in Covid-19 cases and fatalities. As Gujarat neared 55,000 cases on Saturday, 276 of the 1,081 cases added in a single day were

from Surat, which also reported half the state fatalities due to Covid-19. GSRTC buses make a total of 1,200 trips in a day from Surat to other parts of the state. The state, which has been testing more than 13,000 samples since July 21, going up to nearly 15,400 on July 23, saw 13,900 samples taken on Saturday. As per the government press release, with the Unlock 1 and 2 guidelines, the gov-

ernment buses and private buses were running across the state following the norms of social distancing and sanitisation. With cases rising in Surat, a high-power meeting was held in Gandhinagar by the state transport ministry where it was decided to suspend all the private bus services and GSRTC services. Thermal screening and antigen testing of all passengers in private vehicles

coming to Ahmedabad from Surat is also on since three weeks. As per the government, the suspension will not apply to private vehicles and goods carriers. The regular ST bus services and private bus services in other parts of the state will function routinely. Surat has been badly affected by coronavirus post Unclonk-1 and till date the total positive cases in Surat is 11,969, while death toll is 532. Sources in GSRTC Surat said that ST buses that ply between Surat and Saurashtra, from where the city sources its diamond industry workforce, in a day make 92 trips, both ways. The ST buses that ply from Surat to North Gujarat and Ahmedabad make 152 trips. ST buses from Surat to Godhra, Vadodara, Bharuch, Nadiad, Valsad make 244 trips.

Animal sacrifice on Bakri Eid prohibited in public places : Ahmedabad Police

Ahmedabad: Ahead of Bakra Eid, Ahmedabad city police commissioner Ashish Bhatia passed an order under Section 144 prohibiting animal sacrifice in public places or animal processions in Ahmedabad city. As per an order released on Saturday, the directives will be enforced from July 27 to August 5. Eid al Adha or Bakra Eid is expected to fall on August 1 this year.

mohallahs where it can be visible to the public. It is prohibited to take out any 'decked-up' animal as part of procession in public places. After the qurbani act of Bakra Eid, it is prohibited to throw any bones, meat or animal remains in public places. It is compulsory for everyone to wear masks and follow social distancing in public places and it is prohibited for anyone to spit in public places. The guidelines issued by the state and Union governments for the Coronavirus pandemic must



be followed (sic)," read the notification. As per the notification order, the communal harmony can be disrupted if killing of animals is visible to the public. "On August 1, the festival of Bakra Eid is going to be celebrated. As

part of celebrations, qurbani of different types of animals is done. If the killing is visible to public then the belief of people from other communities can be hurt leading to disruption of communal harmony (sic)," read the order. On Sunday morning, a makeshift animal market was set up at the Ellis Bridge near Sabarmati riverfront of Ahmedabad where a huge number of customers showed up, thereby violating social distancing norms, leading to police and authorities removing the

market from the spot by afternoon. The Ahmedabad Municipal Corporation (AMC) officials informed the police that a large number of people have turned up at the Ravivari/Gujari market at Ellis Bridge and social distancing guidelines are being violated therefore as per orders of the AMC officials, the market was vacated today. No case has been registered," said a senior police official under C division of Ahmedabad Police.
